

ETHNICITY







THE SACRAMENTO NATIVE AMERICAN HEALTH CENTER (SNAHC)

serves as both an Urban Indian Organization (UIO) and a Federally Qualifed Health Center (FQHC). As we move into the post-pandemic environment, community led health care has never been more important. At a time when income inequality continues to increase, Medi-Cal coverage is sporadic, and health disparities become ever more evident, UIOs and FQHC's are critical to the success and survival of our most vulnerable patients and community members.

One of the biggest challenges we faced in 2022 was significant provider and staff turnover due to the nationwide "Great Resignation." Studies have shown more providers and staff left primary care than other areas of healthcare. We also found that there were better ways to create work-life balance for our workforce. In 2023 we focused internally and through collaborative work of the Board, leadership team, and staff at all levels throughout the year, we continued to focus on improvement.

This includes a 57% reduction in staff turnover, 24% increase in staffing, launch of a robust communication program to provide regular and transparent updates to staff, and conducting interviews with newly hired staff to proactively identify and address any identified training needs or other issues to improve retention.

SNAHC understands the lasting impacts of COVID-19 on our patients. A total of 56% of our patients experienced 3+ chronic health problems, compared to only 45% in 2020, and

SNAHC behavioral health visits have consistently risen over the past three years. Patient financial and transportation barriers to healthcare have steadily increased, and many report feeling instability at work and in social settings.

SNAHC has been addressing patient and community needs in several ways. In addition to opening a second location and School-Based health center in 2023, SNAHC hired more providers and clinicians, made improvements to its referrals process for specialty care, and intensified its outreach to existing and potential patients. SNAHC also expanded its group therapy options and continued grant-funded programs which connect participants to their culture. As a result, last year SNAHC provided almost 70,000 medical, behavioral health, and dental visits, increased engagement in preventative services like lab work, and increased participation programs for youth and adults.

We are proud to be a Native led FQHC at a time that requires resilience and change. Drawing on the strength of our culture and leveraging traditional strategies to foster strong, sustainable communities, we are committed to responding to the emerging needs of our patients and community.
