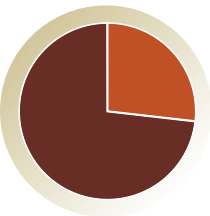

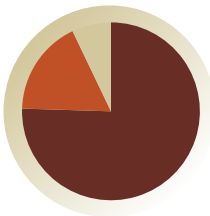

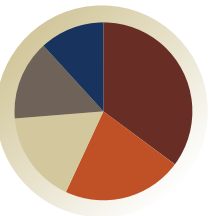
PATIENT DEMOGRAPHICS

ETHNICITY



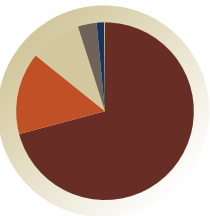

AT THE SACRAMENTO NATIVE AMERICAN HEALTH CENTER (SNAHC), 2024 was more than a year of growth — it was a year of purpose in action.

Across Sacramento County, the need for accessible, culturally grounded care continues to rise. In response, SNAHC deepened its commitment to meeting our community with compassion, strength, and innovation. Every expansion, every new program, and every patient served reflects our belief that healthcare is not simply a service — it is an act of healing rooted in culture, dignity, and belonging.

The opening of our Florin location marked a powerful milestone in our journey. Together with the expansion of school-based and community-centered programs, this growth allowed us to serve more people than ever before. In 2024, SNAHC supported more than 75,000 patient visits — each one representing a story, a family, and a step toward healthier futures. This milestone affirms our role as a trusted health home and a place where individuals feel seen, heard, and valued.

We also witnessed growing demand for behavioral health, dental, and member services — a reflection of the complex and evolving needs of our community. Like health centers across the country, we faced financial pressures, workforce shortages, and shifts in reimbursement. Yet through careful stewardship and steadfast commitment, SNAHC remained resilient. Even in times of uncertainty, we continued to invest in our staff, our services, and the infrastructure that ensures long-term sustainability.

Our outreach efforts expanded with intention and heart. Through community gatherings, school partnerships, and targeted engagement initiatives, we connected with more than

12,000 individuals — extending an open invitation to care. For many, SNAHC is not only a clinic, but a place of welcome, cultural affirmation, and trust. Outreach is how we strengthen that bond and ensure no one feels alone in seeking care.

None of this progress would be possible without our dedicated staff, whose compassion and expertise guide every patient interaction; our Board of Directors, whose leadership keeps us mission-aligned; and our partners, funders, donors, and community allies, whose support strengthens our foundation. Together, we are building something enduring.

As we look ahead, our vision remains clear: a thriving, inclusive community guided by Native traditions and supported by modern, holistic care. We believe in health that honors the whole person — physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual — and in systems rooted in equity, healing, and cultural strength.

While challenges remain, so does our resolve. The path forward is shaped by resilience, guided by tradition, and fueled by the belief that every generation deserves access to compassionate, high-quality care.
